

Aptos History Museum Update:


The History Museum will have displays inside the new library, the Museum will remain at its current location at 7605 Old Dominion Court until such time as we find a new permanent home.

Rio Del Mar History Corner Courtesy of the Aptos History Museum Round and Round We Go

The traffic circle/roundabout at the foot of Rio Del Mar Boulevard was the solution to the problem of four roads and a parking lot converging at a single point. The intersection is now able to deal with nine lanes of travel that must also accommodate fire trucks and buses. This was not always the case.

When development began in Rio Del Mar, in 1926 the Aptos Creek estuary was leveled and raised 7 feet. The creek was channelized. A concrete dam was built in 1928 in order to create the "world's largest freshwater swimming pool", complete with a bathing pavilion. In 1929, the first class, Spanish style Hotel Don Rafael de Castro opened on the bluff overlooking Monterey Bay, exactly where the condominiums at 260 Rio Del Mar Blvd stand today. Traffic was not an issue and there were no traffic control devices at the intersection. Traffic became even less of an issue as the depression and World War II undermined tourism.



After the war, Aptos began to grow, slowly at first and then by the 1960s the Esplanade intersection needed some form of clarification. In 1966 a trial installation of the traffic island was first delineated by cinder blocks. The Rio Del Mar Improvement Association paid for striping the parking spaces, with the assurance that, after a test period, permanent markers would be installed.



In March 1967, the Improvement Association asked the Board of Supervisors for an emergency allocation to restore traffic controls in the Esplanade area before the beach became inundated with Easter vacationers but there was no money in the budget.

Next, legal issues ensued between the county and the State Beach but were eventually resolved and by June 1968 permanent traffic islands were installed.

In the summer of 1999 volunteers from the Aptos Chamber helped to clean up the Esplanade. The traffic island was weeded, the curbs were painted, a small memorial to Realtor Bob Bailey was dedicated and a new Rio Del Mar sign was installed. The labor for the sign was donated by Steve Hosmer of Stokes Signs and Café Rio owner, Pat Duggan, paid for the redwood slab and the lettering. Gwen Kaplan of Lomak Properties arranged for an encroachment permit and got the permit fee waived.

Nothing happens quickly. The newest incarnation of the traffic island had been in the works for a decade. Bill Comfort from the Rio Del Mar Improvement Association and the Aptos Chamber Community Enhancement Committee had been shepherding this project through the county with the assistance of former Supervisor Ellen Pirie. Supervisor Zach Friend secured the final piece of funding through an air quality grant.

What is the difference between a traffic circle and a roundabout? Although they both use a circular design, they operate very differently. Traffic circles are large and are designed for higher speeds. They often have stop signs at their entry points. Roundabouts are designed as small as possible and operate at lower speeds. Roundabouts require drivers to slow and yield to circulating traffic before entering and limit drivers' circulating and exit speeds. The current design also helps prevent drivers from making left turns into oncoming traffic as sometimes happened in the past.



The roundabout features a 14-foot metal sculpture of a seagull in flight known as the Whaley Memorial. It was located on the traffic island at Clubhouse Drive and Rio Del Mar Boulevard. Designed in 1976 by Joseph Spencer, it commemorates Tom Whaley, a retired highway engineer and dedicated Rio Del Mar Improvement Association director who worked on traffic issues and was a tireless worker on behalf of the community. It was originally installed among several small magnolia trees that eventually obscured it.

The project was built by Earthworks Paving Contractors and was completed in 2014.

Update on Soquel Drive Corridor and Highway One Projects

Work is beginning on the largest investment in improvements on Soquel Drive in decades. The Soquel Drive Buffered Bike Lane and Congestion Mitigation Project began this month and will continue until next winter. The project is part of a larger set of traffic and transportation improvements planned along Highway 1 and the Soquel Drive corridor between State Park Drive and La Fonda Avenue with major investments for mid and south county. The funding comes from an over \$100 million grant from the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for muti-modal improvements to our local transportation network.

The funding was awarded from a grant application from the local Regional Transportation Commission (RTC) and is a result of funding from Senate Bill 1: the Solutions for Congested Corridors Program and Local Partnership Competitive Program. Our county's competitiveness for these programs was due in large part to our passage of Measure D in 2016, which provides a local match for these major transportation projects.

The funding works to address a number of issues that are particularly acute in the mid and south-county areas. First, Highway 1 congestion. Congestion on the highway impacts everyone including those simply trying to get to work or return home, emergency vehicles, buses and delivery vehicles. The second issue is cut-through traffic. As a result of the highway congestion, many vehicles exit the highway and create safety issues on local side streets. The third issue is bike and pedestrian safety. Our area is the fifth worst in the state for bike collisions so there is a need for better bike and pedestrian safety facilities, and the increased vehicle usage of Soquel Drive and other side streets is a contributing factor to these increased collisions.

Significant improvements on Soquel Drive, include 5 miles of buffered, protected bicycle lanes, 46 green bike boxes for left turn movements, new sidewalks that connect to existing sidewalk facilities, ADA improvements, 96 crosswalk upgrades, crosswalk warning devices at 10-mid block locations. Installation of adaptive traffic signal control with transit prioritization at 23 intersections will improve bus transit time. Many of these were requested by the community to improve access to local schools and major job centers. For example, near Mar Vista Elementary and Cabrillo College, new buffered bike lanes and sidewalks are planned that will

connect to existing sidewalks and improve pedestrian access to schools. The project will also improve drainage and add retaining walls and/or hardscape where required to improve safety in the area. The Soquel Drive project will require some lane closures between 8:30 am-4:30 pm in the specific area the crews are Bicycle Green Box Design Example Roadway on Soquel Drive to receive connected sidewalks Seacliff Improvement Association Summer 2023 Page 3 working at that time. While this will create some delays in the specific construction areas, the improvements will be significant for our community once completed. This project will harmonize with work currently underway on Highway 1 that will bring three new sets of auxiliary lanes between Soquel Drive and State Park Drive. The first phase of that work, between Soquel and 41st Avenue, is currently underway. This will create the first 5.75 miles of a 7.5-mile hybrid bus-on-shoulder/auxiliary lane facility so transit buses can travel in the auxiliary lane between intersections and on the shoulders at intersections to bypass traffic improving transit travel times.

Two new Highway 1 bicycle/pedestrian overcrossing at Chanticleer Avenue and the long-awaited Mar Vista Drive project, are also part of the ongoing work with Chanticleer's bridge part of this first phase. 
